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


Joint External Evaluation

• Transparent independent, and objective assessment of a country's capacity to prevent, detect, and respond to public health threats




Joint External Evaluation

- Data gathering instrument created to evaluate a country's capacities for health security at a national level across all sectors
- Designed to examine countryspecific capacity across 19 technical areas
- Combines qualitative and quantitative measures





• How to use the benchmark tool:

Step 1

 Review the priority recommendations based on the situation analysis of the selected technical areas.

Step 2

 Review the benchmark actions and determine which capacity level a county would like to achieve. The planning team can use actions mentioned in the tool

Step 3

Identify the actions that countries need to establish to achieve the selected level.


Step 4

 Develop a list of activities for each action that countries need to put in place to achieve the desired level for all actions.
